Stewardship Season


The 2025 Annual Stewardship Campaign is underway, and we are asking all parishioners to submit their pledge of financial support for the coming year. Here are some Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) to help you understand what the Annual Campaign is about and why your pledge is so important.

Why are we asked to make a pledge now for the coming year?

The 2025 budgeting process will soon be underway. To plan fiscally responsible budgets, your leadership depends on the pledge process to estimate income for the coming year.


Where do my gifts go?

Our largest expenses are staff salaries and building maintenance. But it is our staff and our church building that make possible so much of what we do. Looking at our expenses by what they enable tells a different story (see pie chart below).



Does St. Paul's have other sources of income?

Annual giving from parishioners, through pledge gifts or other offerings, makes up 72% of all income. Because of past parishioner generosity, our endowment and trust income provide an additional 24% (see pie chart below). St. Paul's is truly a "member supported" institution!



Why is my support even more important during the interim year?

The essence of a congregation is not defined by the clergy leadership at any given time, but rather by the parishioners who call the church their parish home. A talented rector can work with a congregation to help them focus their gifts and passions to achieve their aspirations as a parish. As rector candidates discern a call to St. Paul's, it is important that they see us as the vibrant and committed congregation we are. Maintaining our financial support is a healthy sign of that commitment.



A Heartfelt Invitation

Dr. Melodie Yates and her writing have already made an impression on St. Paul's! Member Patricia Cangelosi-Williams offered this reflection on Melodie's career, poetry, and impact.

Like many couples, Doctors Melodie and Richard Yates wanted to stay active after "retiring." But their plans had to change when Richard began living with Alzheimer's disease.

Regardless of Melodie's professional accomplishments and the support of her family and friends, caring for her husband and navigating his decline brought Melodie to her knees. It was frightening to feel like she was losing herself and her perseverence. She turned to poety as a mechanism for survival, regeneration, and expressing emotional angst.

Melodie's book, Love is an Action Verb: A Caregiver's Journey, is an earthy representation of her experience, framed as poems about truth, vulnerability, courage, and strength. It is a portrayal of the helplessness, frustration, and loneliness that erupt internally as caregivers manifest outward calm and kindness.

Her soul-searching reflections offer the deep, raw truth about the realities of long-term caregiving. Underpinning the entire collection is the central theme of relying on God.

"I can speak to the deep spiritual life Melody and Richard are living. A testament to this is his soul connection to Melodie. Even in the later stages of Alzheimer's, he remembers who she is. What a blessing!"

In Memory of Dr. Richard Nelson: Beloved Musician, Educator and Friend

Richard Nelson, PhD, was a revered music educator known for his lifelong dedication to nurturing young musicians.

For more than 20 years, he served as the Director of Music

for Children and Youth at St. Paul's, where he worked alongside his beloved wife, Dr. Beth Nelson. Together, they created a vibrant musical community. Hired by then-rector the Rev. Nicholson B. White, Rick introduced the Royal School of Church Music program to St. Paul's, building a strong choral foundation that nurtured countless choristers and families. His deep love for the English choral tradition left a lasting imprint on those who sang under his direction.

Dr. Nelson's influence extended far beyond St. Paul's. Each summer, he sent many of his choristers to study at the prestigious St. Thomas Girls Chorister Course in New York City, helping them grow as musicians and people. Many of these former choristers have gone on to pursue careers in music, a testament to the profound impact he had on their lives. He collaborated closely with Steven Plank and Karel Paukert during his time at St. Paul's, forming a harmonious partnership that elevated the church's music program.

One of his most cherished memories was visiting King's College, Cambridge, for Christmas—a special experience that brought him immense joy. His gratitude to Jeanne, Steve, and Karel for allowing him to miss Christmas at St. Paul's that year was something he often expressed with deep appreciation.

Beyond the church, Rick made his mark as a beloved faculty member at the Cleveland Institute of Music (CIM), where he taught music theory from 1996 until his retirement in 2018. Nearly every student who passed through CIM during those years had the privilege of learning from him. His patience, expertise, and love for teaching left an indelible mark on their education. In addition to his work at CIM, he graded AP Music Theory exams and contributed greatly to the broader field of music education. Before his time at CIM, he taught at Mercer University.

In retirement, he found peace and joy in Hilton Head, where he became an avid boater. His days on the water, often spent reading or listening to music, were some of his happiest. Surrounded by local barbecue spots, he was truly in his happy place.

Dr. Nelson's legacy lives on in the hearts of his students, choristers, and colleagues whose lives were made better by his warmth, wisdom, and unwavering support.

An Update From the Wardens

When we warmly welcomed the Right Reverend Jeff Lee to serve as our Interim Rector/Bishop in Residence for the next several months, we noted that we would soon be able to identify the priest who will follow Bishop Jeff's ministry when it concludes early in 2025.

We are very pleased that the Reverend Dr. Stephen Applegate will serve as our full-time Interim Rector. St. Paul's will be the sixth parish in a row that Stephen has helped through their transitions to new rectors. Bishop Jeff appointed Stephen to be the interim of All Saints' Chicago – one of the parishes in his diocese. Given a strong previous working relationship, the passing of the baton from one to the other will be seamless.

For the past year Stephen has been the Interim Rector of Trinity Episcopal Church in Toledo. A graduate of Hamilton College, he attended his 50th college reunion in June.

He is a cum laude graduate of The General Theological Seminary in New York City and earned a Doctorate of Ministry in Congregational Development from Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, California. He received interim training through the Interim Ministry Network and is a member of that organization.

In addition to leading congregations, Stephen has served as both secretary and president of the Standing Committee in the Diocese of Southern Ohio and was the president of the Trustees of the Diocese, a team of five that oversaw over \$100 million in investments.

Stephen is passionate about congregational life and finds joy in strengthening churches as they

prepare to welcome their next rector. In his work, he is aided by his pastoral associate, Bernie, an 11-year-old black Labrador retriever. He and his wife, Terry, a retired first grade teacher, make their home in Granville, a small college town (Denison University) not far from Columbus, OH.
