Youth Acolyte Training and Refresher Day

On Saturday, August 24 from 9:30-11:30 a.m., St. Paul's will host a day of fun and learning for youth acolytes. The training and refresher day will help orient new and veteran youth acolytes to the program. Running the training will be the Rev. Gabriel Lawrence and director of children and youth ministries Lauren Dockery.

What are acolytes, exactly? According to the Episcopal dictionary, "acolyte" is a general term which covers not only servers, torchbearers, and lighters of candles but also crucifers (one who carries a cross), thurifers (one who carries a censer burning incense), and banner-bearers. The term acolyte has been around since at least 252 A.D. Basically, an acolyte is anyone who assists in liturgy.

The training will include games and doughnuts as well as a walk-through of the liturgy and an instructed Eucharist. Youth will have an opportunity to participate in the walk-through and try on clerical vestments. Rev. Gabriel stressed that the training is for both new youth acolytes as well as a refresher for those who have served before.

The overall goal is to engage more youth as acolytes and make worship at St. Paul's even more vibrant and meaningful. "I want our youth to enjoy serving when it's their Sunday to acolyte," said Rev. Gabriel. "I want them to find personal meaning in what they do and what they offer in the service to God."

Independently, Rev. Gabriel is also seeking adults to serve as acolyte mentors, who help prepare youth acolytes for Sunday services. Interested parties should contact Rev. Gabriel at glawrence@stpauls-church.org.

Transition Update from the Wardens

As everyone knows, we are in a transition period between Rectors. We've made some progress but there is much work ahead.

Two parishioners have agreed to serve as co-chairs and we are actively recruiting other committee members. We are in the process of forming the Search Committee, which will be formally commissioned on Kickoff Sunday, September 8. The Committee's work will kick off in the fall. One of the most important steps in the Committee's work will be to discern our needs in a new Rector. This will be a broad effort that will likely include small groups, large meetings, and surveys. It will be the work of the Committee to ensure that all our Parish voices are heard.

Simultaneously, the Committee will develop our Parish Profile, describing our community in depth to assist in recruiting appropriate candidates. We anticipate being able to begin recruiting candidates early in the new year.

The Committee will be ably assisted by our friend and former Associate Rector, Canon to the Ordinary the Reverend Jessie Dodson, and by Anne Schmidt, the search consultant who helped the Diocese to recruit Bishop Anne.

We had hoped by now to have an Interim Rector in place. That hasn't happened yet, due to a shortage of interim priests at a time when many parishes are in transition. And our calling is special – we are a large and well-resourced Parish, and a calling as our interim is a big job. While we did identify capable candidates, one chose another opportunity and a second chose to leave interim ministry. We are still looking, but we must accept that we may not have an Interim Rector for some time.

That said, we are blessed with a team capable of getting us through this period. Our Assistant Rectors Patricia, Gabriel, and Rose Anne are leading worship, pastoral care, formation, and our other ministries. Kevin's music program is a magnificent gift to us all and to Christ. Lauren is putting together a stimulating year for our youth. Pam keeps the ship running smoothly. Susan and I are regularly plugged into staff meetings and day to day operations.

Your continued and ongoing support is gratefully appreciated – and critically important. We are excited about a new beginning, and we will get there with your help.
